

## Bike along the reef in Bora Bora



Diving and snorkelling opportunities are more or less par for the course when you visit the world's great island destinations. But how about cycling a living reef in an eco-friendly underwater scooter? On Bora Bora's unique Aquabike Adventures, you won't need a diving certification, flippers or a snorkel, as you comfortably cruise ten feet below the surface. ## Get married underwater

## Explore Moorea on an All Terrain Vehicle



The island of Moorea is something of a triple threat, having a less 'touristy' feel than other popular Tahitian islands, while still being both affordable, and hope-

lessly romantic. While an ATV ride through the countryside might not be everyone's idea of a honeymoon activity, it is a great way to see the island, and a more relaxed side of Tahitian life. Tours typically last between two and four hours, or can be customised for a private tour.

## Take in paradise from above – at 120 miles per hour!

Skydiving might not spring to mind when you think of Tahiti, but it offers an incredible way to see the islands from above. Experience all the thrills of this extreme sport while taking in sensational views of Moorea or Bora Bora. A tandem jump with an experienced instructor will have you parachuting safely into paradise, with about six to eight minutes of air time, and incredible views.

## Go drift snorkelling at Taha'a island resort



Old fashioned snorkelling too sedate for you? How about riding the swift current through some of the world's most beautiful coral systems? Guests at Taha'a resort can explore the old fashioned way, or ride the drifts right to the middle of a coral garden.

## "Shoot the Pass" at the Blue Lagoon

## Have breakfast delivered to your overwater bungalow by canoe



Bora Bora has made the overwater bungalow famous, but why hurry to come ashore for breakfast? The staff at several of the island's best resorts can deliver the most important meal of the day right to your bungalow – and they come by sea, in a traditional canoe.

## Eat cheap at Les Roulottes in Papeete

On a tight budget, but still want to experience Tahiti? It can be done. Bora Bora might not be the land of the thrifty, but the namesake island, which supports most of French Polynesia's population, offers its own delights at a fraction of the cost. No stay in the capital is complete without an evening grazing Les Roulottes, a collection of food trucks on Papeete's waterfront that will satisfy even the most demanding culinary hipster. # Africa Adventure Train

Like the unusual southern African travel experience it offers, the name Shongololo Express is uniquely African. Meaning "centipede" in Zulu, the name was given by the indigenous people to the first trains they saw – when viewed on the horizon, the train resembled for them the appearance and movement of the Shongololo.

A unique concept introduced in South Africa in 1995, the Great Shongololo Express Adventure offers foreign tourists a taste of some of the best tourist destinations and most breathtaking sights.

Traveling by rail at night enables guests to cover a lot of ground during a 16-day stay in Southern Africa. Interminable hours in dusty tour buses on remote roads are eliminated, saving travellers precious holiday time. Every day brings the excitement of a new destination, without the bane of continually having to pack and unpack suitcases.

A fully serviced traveling hotel train, Shongololo is designed to give guests time to unwind with like-minded people from all over the world, while taking in the magic of Africa.

Aboard the train at night original African cuisine is served by candle light from Cape Dutch and Malay to authentic African dishes from many regions of the continent.

Occasionally when they're not dining on board the train, the guests are treated to a traditional

South African "braai" (barbeque).

Variety and flexibility are trademarks of the Shongololo experience. Breakfasts are served on board from 06h15 to 08h15 to accommodate early and late risers. A variety of daily touring options included in the overall tour price are available at each destination. Partners have the option of splitting up for the day with one able to choose a battlefield tour, while the other might prefer a mountain hike.

A choice of exciting optional extras are also available - you could float by hot air balloon over the Namib desert with a champagne breakfast to follow, or cruise to a wonderful Indian Ocean Island, scuba dive, horse ride, do biking on sand dunes or even bungee jumping.

Shongololo trains are not luxury trains, but they offer comfort and great value for money. The twin bedded apartments have plenty of cupboards and hanging space and there is a shower and bathroom just down the corridor. The style is informal on board. It is not a tiara and dinner jacket environ-

ment – guests are encouraged to bring casual wear for their trip into the heart of Africa.

Daily excursions are undertaken by Shongololo's own modified coaches, which travel aboard the train ensuring a prompt and efficient departure each day.

The Shongololo Southern Cross tour is perhaps the greatest of the three travel experiences currently offered. Covering 6 countries in 17 days, this carefully crafted route delivers such stunning views as the Victoria Falls, The Zimbabwe Ruins and the Matopos Hills in Zimbabwe, Pigg's Peak in Swaziland and the Blyde River Canyon and God's Window in South Africa. The tour offers a rare insight into the cultural geographical kaleidoscope of southern Africa with stopovers among others, in Mbabane in Swaziland, Botswana's Chobe Nature Reserve, Livingstone in Zambia, Maputo in Mozambique and the Kruger National Park in South Africa.

The Good Hope trip of 14 days takes in no less than 23 of the 25 sights marked as "must" for visitors to South Africa by South African Tourism. Starting in Cape Town, it crisscrosses the country the country from the Cape Winelands, Bloemfontein and Kimberly, the Drakensberg, Durban, Zululand, the Kruger National Park, Pretoria and Johannesburg, with a brief stop-over in Swaziland.

The daily excursions on offer have been designed to cater for a variety of tastes. Nature lovers can sample the cream of South Africa's nature reserves with visits to

areas like the Cape of Good Hope and Cape Point and the Garden of Eden in the Western Cape, to the Amphitheatre and Royal Natal Park in the Drakensberg in Natal, and the internationally renowned Kruger National Park.

Souvenir hunters have plenty to choose from on excursions to the craft shops in the Indian Market in Durban and the curio shops and road-side traders in and around the Kruger National Park. Some of the most scenic and entertaining local sights are covered including a trip up Table Mountain, a tour of the diamond capital of the world, Kimberly and Big Hole and a Soweto Shebeen tour.

The Shongololo Dune Express also sets out from Johannesburg en route to Bloemfontein and Kimberly. After a visit to the Au-grabies Falls nature reserve, the train crosses the border into Namibia, stopping

over at the world's second largest canyon, the Fish River Canyon on its way to the quaint coastal town of Luderitz. In the Kalahari Desert guests visit a San settlement Intu-Africa and then on to Sossusvlei with its unusual inland vlei surrounded by red sand dunes – the highest dunes in the world. A trip through the Etosha National Reserve provides an opportunity to spot some of the 114 mammal 340 bird species resident in the area. Stopovers are made in Swakopmund and Windhoek.

The Shongololo Express is a unique way of sampling the best of what Africa has to offer for foreign and local tourist alike.

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# Japanese Alps: Home of Snow Monkeys



Snow Monkeys in Japan - probably the most relaxed in the world

The mountainous region of Nagano looks like a freeze-frame of exploding fireworks. Red maple and yellow ginkgo trees drape the rugged terrain. Clean waters and cool air attract those escaping sum-

mer heat. Even a monkey can enjoy the region's beauty—and its resident snow monkeys do exactly that.

Descending from the trees, the world's northernmost monkeys plunge into the hot springs of Jigokudani to stake their claim.



Matsumoto Castle is one of Japan's premier historic castles. The building is also known as the "Crow Castle" due to its black exterior.

When the temperature drops, they luxuriate in thermal springs, pampering and grooming each other. We hike for half an hour along an ascending wooded-path to see them. They're probably the most relaxed monkeys in the world and while they're aware of us, they are happily preoccupied kings of their domain.

Many visit Nagano to get out of the city and into nature, and fruit picking has become a popular activity. Cherries in June, peaches in August, grapes in early fall, and then apples. Almost a quarter of all Japan's apples come from Nagano. The most prized are called Sun-Fuji. Straight out of a fairy tale, they are noted for their translucent golden honeycomb centre and intoxicating sweetness. Participants in the apple-picking course at Shinshu Fruits Land in Shinshu Nakano are handed a "special peeler" and unleashed into the orchard.

Nearby Matsumoto Castle was once maintained as a military fortress. Square windows were used for muskets, while rectangular ones were for archers. Seven thousand samurai once surrounded the oldest castle tower in Japan. Today it is a national treasure, housing munitions and samurai armour. Visitors ascend six floors of steep stairs to the top floor, where the warlords would meet to strategize. Views from here stretch for miles, over the clear moat below and the lush land beyond, all the way to the snowy

mountain peaks that crown the valley on the horizon.

Outside the city is the Daio Wasabi Farm, the largest wasabi farm in Japan. These 15 hectares produce 500 kilograms of Japanese horseradish per day, up to an annual yield of 150 tonnes per year. The fields of green roots dotted with pretty watermills look deceptively sweet, but pack a sinus-burning heat. We sample wasabi treats ranging from lollipops, cakes, potato croquettes, frankfurters and ice cream, washed down with a refreshing but spicy juice.

Hida-Takayama, in nearby Gifu, is a wealthy merchant town from the Edo period that has preserved its traditional character. Strolling narrow Sannomachi Street, one can find centuries-old trinket shops and sake breweries where we can sample and compare premium artisanal sake with notes of melon and banana. The key ingredient is the water, and its purity can be tasted in every sip. A highlight however is the prized Hida beef. Distinguished by its high-quality marbling, lustre and texture, a robust juice and aroma fills each mouth-watering bite. Various shops grill beef skewers sold by the grade of their firmness.

Old folktale villages such as Shirakawa-go and Gokayama dot the countryside of Gifu and Toyama prefectures. These UNESCO World Heritage sites are fairly isolated. Long ago, prisoners who were ban-

ished from the rest of civilization were sent here. Their thatched-roof houses are shaped like the cupped hands of one in prayer. Locals cultivate silkworms and make rice paper. Quiet and remote, these towns feel far removed from the high-octane pace of Tokyo, just a few hours away.

The Japanese way is not one of opulence, but one of shunning off the unnecessary clutter. From cherry blossoms to fall foliage, a trip through the Nagano region of the Japan Alps will reinvigorate any traveller's sense of well-being and wonder.



# Colombia Blends Old and New

Colombia has three weekend getaway destinations with a perfect blend of old and new - Bogota, Cartagena and Medellin. With frequent flights connecting North America and Colombia, this South American up and coming country is quickly gaining appeal as a short-trip destination. Fun and magical experiences find you as soon as you arrive in Colombia. There is an abundance of activities to do, sights to see, and culture to experience. If you don't know where to start, we focus on three of the country's most important cities, where you will be surprised by the seamless blend of historical sights and a growing, modern economy running at full steam.

## BOGOTA

Sitting on a plateau of the Andes mountain range at an altitude of over 8,500 feet, Colombia's capital is a striking metropolis where people from all over the country hustle and bustle all day long. The city, with its iconic red-brick buildings and blend of colonial and

modern architecture, is surrounded by green mountains to the East and opens up to a fertile green valley to the North.

Throughout the many and distinct neighbourhoods, you will find traditional and avant-garde restaurants, a busy night life, top-notch museums and large municipal parks.

History lovers will relish in the many museums and restored colonial buildings of the old downtown and the Candelaria district, including the Mint Museum, the Bogota Cathedral and Plaza de Bolivar, and the church-museum of Santa Clara featuring a stunning baroque gold-laminated ceiling and original religious artwork. Going back to times before the Spanish conquest, the Gold Museum is a must-see: a source of national pride, the site contains over 60,000 original pieces of jewelry, crafts, tools and sacred objects made by the many indigenous groups that populated Colombia before Christopher Columbus's arrival.

For a good dose of modernity, Bogota offers high-end shopping and dining districts such as Parque 93, the "Zones" T and G and Usaquen, where locals and tourists mingle in patios and pedestrian walkways, and top-rated restaurants and local pubs boast full tables any day of the week.

## CARTAGENA

Many Canadians will describe Cartagena de Indias as "Quebec City on the Caribbean," because of the high stone walls that protect this historic town located on the Atlantic Ocean in northern Colombia. Unlike Quebec City's

walls, however, Cartagena's thick structures were built to protect it from pirates more than 300 years ago.

On a stroll along the walled city—a designated UNESCO World Heritage Site—you will find old cannons and the San Felipe de Barajas castle. Then, just as fast, you will stumble upon a group of patrons sipping cocktails and taking in the Caribbean sunset at one of the several local restaurants and bars located on the walls, music flowing from the outdoor speakers. If you're hungry, you can always get a fresh fruit snack from the colourfully-dressed palenqueras, women in traditional garb carrying fruit trays on their heads.

Also known for inspiring the works of writer Gabriel Garcia Marquez, Nobel Prize Laureate and known as the father of Magical Realism, Cartagena is one of the most tourist-friendly spots in all of Colombia, receiving thousands of visitors every year. The town offers something for everyone: from history buffs to honeymooners looking for quiet luxury on the islands off the coast of Cartagena, to foodies on a quest for great ceviche, to families engaging in activities like snorkeling, scuba diving and feeding dolphins at the local aquarium.

## MEDELLIN

The second you arrive in Medellin, you will be smitten: parks, libraries, museums and public spaces bustling with cultural events make of this fast-growing but mellow-feeling city a great spot to visit in Colombia. Medellin is the second largest city in the country and one of its most important industrial

hubs. In 2013, Medellin was voted "Most Innovative City" in the world by The Wall Street Journal.

It is also a fashion capital, so activities from shopping to people-watching to hunting for inspirational designs in the town's many independent stores are strongly encouraged.

Known as "The city of eternal spring" for its near-perfect weather, Medellin is an easy-to-visit, hard-to-leave place. There are flowers everywhere; the yearly Flower Festival features giant tableaus of themes ranging from pop artists to religious figures built entirely from fresh bulbs. There are plenty of music, theater, and dance festivals held in open spaces; smooth public transportation including a sky train and a cable car; traditional and modern restaurants, street vendors selling the ubiquitous arepa (flat corn breads) and many kid-friendly museums and attractions.

You can't miss visiting the Guatapé Reservoir, the Rafael Uribe Uribe Palace of Culture and the

Plaza Botero, featuring 23 giant bronze sculptures by the native and world-renowned artist Fernando Botero.

# Anita Mendiratta

Packing no more than carry on, Anita flies around the world, talking about tourism as an engine of change, not just for the world's economies, but for communities on a local, national, and global scale. She now leads Cachet Consulting, focusing her attention on tourism and economic development, where she continues to be a trusted industry advisor. The UN World Tourism Organisation, CNN International, and a range of tourism organisations across Europe, the Middle East, Asia, the Americas and Africa have all sought her expertise.

Anita's message channels years of experience, insight, idealism, realism and critical direction into boundless optimism. She celebrates success stories from across the globe – nations in rebirth such as Myanmar and Cuba, and nations in recovery such as Egypt and Kenya. Her monthly blog post have become a ritualistic mirror of what matters today, just as her celebration of each day's achievements with a glass of champagne after dark. It's one of three rituals that Anita takes with her around the world, the other being a bracing morning swim.

While countries in crisis or dramatic recovery might grab the headlines, they constitute only part of Anita's work. She's all too aware of her industry's size and importance, even while it might be underappreciated by others. Travel is now the third largest sector in the world, generating six trillion USD in revenues every year. In that environment, it is a constantly evolving challenge for destinations to maintain and, to some extent, control their brands. That's where Anita comes in, offering advice in destination strategy and image management, with emphasis on how to maintain destination image and invitation consistency, and by extension, traveller trust through

challenging times.

Every interaction, she explains, has a ripple effect on a nation's image, like a pebble dropped into a pond. No matter how small, that pebble will make an impact. If the impact is positive, destinations can ride the wave to significant gains for their tourism industry, and their broader national perceptions. As simple as they may appear on the surface, Anita points to Amal Clooney, who through her high profile Hollywood marriage, has returned the west's eye to her native Lebanon, inspiring curiosity around the country from which this beautiful human rights lawyer and bachelor-for-life charmer hails. Similarly, the way in which South Africa, Anita's adopted home, has experienced a rebirth as a result of the Mandela miracle and major events such as the 2010 FIFA World Cup. Meaningful moments and personalised have the power to transform the image and appeal of nations for the positive.

Likewise, a negative perception of a public figure or even a negative interaction with an individual can affect a nation's image, while being outside its control. It can also be a two-edged sword. Kazakhstan has enjoyed a tremendous boost to its international profile thanks to Borat, but not the kind it had in mind. The world's largest landlocked country has had to balance its new found brand awareness against a 'spokesperson' it would probably rather do without.

But for Anita, every interaction – every 'pebble' thrown into a nation's branding pond is an opportunity. Some of the most positive interactions can be relatively simple, she explains, if travellers are prepared to put the camera down long enough to live them. Anita points to a safari as one example, where travellers are often so

caught up in photographing their adventures that they miss powerful details, such as a Cheetah's breath as it digests its kill, or the scent of the grassy plains. All these things not only build a strong national brand, but define the 'heartbeat' of a destination. There's no secret to feeling that, explains Anita, other than taking a moment to pause and notice those details and personal connections.

People are of course a big part of equation, with locals both inside and outside the tourism industry playing a big part in their country's brand, and tourism in turn playing a big part in the country's social fabric. Locals quite literally become the face of their country. In celebrating what is unique about where people live, says Anita, tourism is "the fuel for national pride, unity, and importantly, competitiveness. It gives (the) people of the nation a proud feeling of 'this is my home,' and a part to play in keeping it strong, safe, inviting and uniting."

What happens then, when a destination does turn hostile or dangerous, or when the tourism market is devastated by natural or economic disaster? With such factors outside a nation's control, Anita stresses

the importance of letting a country know they are not alone, and allowing its tourism stakeholders to vent constructively. Such disaster can often bring government and private tourism forces together, setting the ideal stage for rebuilding. Better yet, she says, is having those forces habitually and routinely aligned, long before disaster strikes. Communities and tourism industries that are already working together and sharing goals can more swiftly leverage the potential of a bad situation.

Anita points to examples in the Philippines, Kenya, and Egypt, where she has directly played a part in helping floundering tourism industries move forward with confidence and pride. Egypt for instance took a tremendous hit to its tourism industry during its revolutionary years, a wound that has still far from healed. However, travellers that journey to the land of the Pharaohs are now also interested to see Tahir Square, the epicentre of the 2011 'Arab Spring' as they are the Pyramids of Giza or Luxor's legendary Valley of the Kings. It's another example of challenges opening new opportunities for countries to rebrand, rebuild

and reinspire travellers.

As she flies around the world, helping destinations secure and strengthen their image and industry, Anita maintains a strong brand of her own, one that's as simple as it is powerful. It's also the key to her rule of only packing carry-on luggage, whether travelling for 72 hours or 7 weeks!

"I only wear one colour - black," she says when asked for packing tips. "Black is the perfect canvas. With the right jewellery, combinations can be created that allow for visible differences day after day, and you never look underdressed." Anita admits her technique may be more difficult for male travellers with their bulky suits and shoes, but for her, it's become a lifesaver. Her varied collection of jewellery from around the world has become something of a guilty pleasure, but it too, plays its part in her work. "Jewellery packs small, adds a lovely local touch which those I am meeting usually take pride in seeing, and it's a wonderful excuse to buy precious jewellery keepsakes from around the world, capturing memories of favourite places in tiny little boxes of gems!"



Aranui Cave is set in the Ruakuri Scenic Reserve, 5 minutes drive from the Waitomo Glowworm Caves. It is named after Ruruku Aranui, the local Maori man who first discovered this previously hidden gem back in 1910.

Aranui Cave has a natural cave entrance and is the smallest and most delicate of Waitomo's three main caves. As a dry cave without a river running through it, it houses very little life past its entrance.

However, just inside the entrance is a colony of native New Zealand cave wetas and further into the cave is the most beautiful collection of stalactites, stalagmites, flowstones and decorative formations.

# Efficiency Downunder

As more and more people turn to cruising for the benefit of seeing numerous landscapes but only unpacking once, so motorhome explorations are gaining in popularity. They can save you money by self-catering, and enjoying the space of your own "apartment", but also offer the benefit of waking up to a view of a different National Park every morning!

In Australia and New Zealand there are great cities to explore, but for the ultimate experience, motorhomes can't be beaten for their benefits. Travel between cities is a key element of a journey Downunder. There are the traditional holidays parks where you can hook up to the facilities for a small fee, but if you travel with a larger vehicle, you can enjoy the peace and serenity of parking your vehicle in a National Park.

Several years ago I took a campervan from Sydney and travelled north to the wine region at the Hunter Valley, and was pointed in the direction of "Pretty Beach" on the Central Coast. Paying a nominal vehicle National Park fee, I parked in the late afternoon and set up the barbecue (note not all of the vehicles have this feature). Fully self contained, I cooked a traditional Aussie steak on the barbecue and enjoyed a meal, enhanced by a fantastic red I had picked up at a cellar door during the day, and headed to the beach to enjoy my dinner while the sun set. I was the only person at the beach, and in the park that night (ok, maybe a little scary for a single woman!), but slept to the sound of the waves crashing on the beach; this was probably one of my most memorable experiences ever in Australia!

Driving the vehicle was easier than I'd thought; roads are wide and perfectly suited to driving large

vehicles in most cases. As I stopped along the way, locals would offer suggestions of destinations "off the beaten track" or a local restaurant or café for something to eat; even diverting me into Ku-Ring-gai National Park to see some of the aboriginal rock art that the country is famous for. I was "sold" on motorhomes from that moment on; they aren't for retirees only, but great for families or anyone who just wants to enjoy a leisurely journey and really get to know the people and land.

I'd rented with Maui Motorhomes (represented by Goway), who are one of the biggest operators in the South Pacific (they also have cars for those that aren't ready to make the transition to driving the big vehicles!) partly because their vehicles are automatic. I can drive stick shift, but I felt I would rather focus on the scenery. The company focuses on design and development, and in the few short years since my experience, the vehicles have developed even more, now offering more comfortable seating areas, even a LCD screen so that you can view all of those spectacular photos taken during the day! They offer a wide range of vehicles from the compact Ultima perfect for one or two travellers, right up to a vehicle which not only sleeps six, but has a flexible rear bed set up.

In New Zealand vehicle prices start from US \$100 and in Australia from US \$105 per day. Maui offers complimentary airport transfers, and include an extensive briefing upon pick up. And if you forget how to use any of the equipment (many do!) you can call into the depot or consult the vehicle manual. Maui also now includes GPS rental in their daily rate from 1 April 2016, great for finding nearby facilities. Goway has all of the details.
